



Ski Industry News



Powdr Corp., parent company of Park City, Utah as well as Alpine Meadows, Boreal and Soda Springs in California, is in a struggle to acquire two new ski areas— Winter Park, CO and Mt. Bachelor, OR. Here's the

latest news in the two unfolding dramas.

Denver Says Winter Park Not for Sale —

Powdr Corp. announced its interest in partnering with the city of Denver in running Winter Park. After an off season in 1999-2000, Winter park exercised its option to skip a rent payment to the city valued at \$2.3 million, which led to Denver's reevaluation of the ski area. The city put together a panel to decide the fate of the resort, which needs extensive capital investment of more than \$63 million to bring it up to snuff so as to be competitive with other Colorado ski resorts.

Denver Mayor said the city would not sell Winter Park

Resort, but would begin hunting for a partner to help run it and infuse it with the cash necessary to keep it competitive. The announcement came a day after the 25-person Winter Park Advisory Committee picked by the mayor recommended the city either sell the resort or form a joint partnership to manage it.

Mt. Bachelor Recommends Pape Group Offer —

Mt. Bachelor's Board of Directors decided to recommend that shareholders accept the Pape Group's offer to purchase the ski area because it would bring them more money. But the choice of selling to former CEO **Randy Pape** or **Powdr Corp.**, which reported last month it had secured commitments on about 70 percent of Mount Bachelor shares, is still up to the shareholders.

If **Powdr Corp.** purchases enough shares or obtains enough signed tender offers to win voting control, it will ask Mount Bachelor's board of directors to approve a merger agreement. That would probably result in a **Powdr Corp.** move to add significant snowmaking as

one of the first improvements it makes to Bachelor.

If the **Pape Group** gains the majority, it's likely that **Intrawest** would be brought in to manage the resort. Pape has said his concern is to keep ownership of Mt. Bachelor local. **Intrawest** has twice offered to purchase Bachelor in the last few years but was turned down by its board. **Intrawest's** first move would probably be to build a village at the mountain's base.

New Forest Chief Named—

The Bush administration has announced that **Dale Bosworth**, a career U.S. Forest Service officer, has been picked to take the place of former forest service chief **Mike Dombeck**. **Dombeck**, who came to the service from the Bureau of Land Management, resigned because of differences with the Bush administration.

Initial reaction to **Bosworth's** appointment was one of gratification that the choice was an insider. Interestingly, **Bosworth** — like his predecessor — has been a defender of former president Bill Clinton's Roadless Initiative. For his part, **Dombeck** recommended the Bush administration not negotiate a settlement of the road-building ban as he left his office.

Last summer, **Bosworth** was quoted as saying that both detractors and those who claim the initiative does not do enough to protect roadless areas have been guilty of distortion. In fact, he noted, the initiative provides plenty of recreational use while adding another layer of

protection to the land in question. ❖

SAFETY— from being robbed

At your business —

Report suspicious circumstances or people to the police — this diminishes your risk.

Comprehensive training on robbery prevention &

survival is offered free by your local police department. Communicate with other businesses in your neighborhood. Make a robbers job more difficult by keeping a minimum amount of cash on hand and advertise this. Pretend you are a robber and check out your premises for lighting and visibility — don't block windows with large boxes, etc.

During a robbery all bets are off! Assume the man is nuts or probably on drugs and your responsibility is to survive safely so comply with his demands. Give the robber your best customer service. If the robber says he has a weapon, believe him. Let him think he is in control. Talk to the robber, don't leave him guessing. Tell him that you will cooperate and do exactly what he wants. Do not resist. Do not argue. Do not use a weapon. Do not follow him.

Protecting yourself from an armed robbery —

Purse snatching is a common crime facing women, but strong-arm robbery (hold-ups, muggings) is the most prevalent act where men are generally the victims. Use common sense and you will greatly reduce your chances of being victimized.

- 1. Travel on well lit streets. Avoid dark corners, alleys and entrances to buildings. Walk on the side of the street nearest to oncoming traffic.
- 2. If you must travel at night regularly, consider carrying a second wallet with a few bucks & old credit cards which you can give to the suspect. Focus on his looks so you can give police an accurate description.
- 3. There's safety in numbers. Travel with a companion when possible.
- 4. When waiting for a bus or taxi, select a well lit, preferably busy spot.
- 5. Don't hitchhike or accept rides from strangers.

Never pick up hitchhikers.

- 6. Avoid taking shortcuts through deserted areas such as parks, playgrounds or vacant lots.
- 7. Be cautious when entering and exiting your car. Someone can be hiding inside or nearby.
- 8. Never carry weapons that can be used against you.
- 9. If someone asks directions, be polite but keep a safe distance.
- 10. If you think you are being followed, head for an occupied building (bar, restaurant, gas station) and if none is available cross the street in the middle of the block and try to stop a car for help.

If you are confronted, do not resist! Your life is more valuable than any of your replaceable possessions. Don't make any sudden or unexpected moves as the criminal may think you are reaching for a weapon.

Never try to be a hero and apprehend the criminal yourself. Notify a police officer ASAP.

Tips when traveling—

Ask for directions before heading off to local attractions because lost tourists are easy targets. If you do get lost, ask for directions from a

business and be wary of strangers who seem overly anxious to help. Be careful on the beach and always check with the lifeguards about tides, currents and wave action.

Use travelers check or credit cards and keep the serial numbers in a separate safe location. Carry only the cash you need in small denominations. Be aware of your surroundings and never discuss your plans or the amount of money you are carrying. Do not display your money openly. Carry your purse close to your body and your wallet in your front pocket.

Your plane & bus tickets are as good as cash— keep track of them. Photocopy your important documents (passport, tickets) and store them safely.

Leave nonessential papers, credit cards, at home. If your car breaks down, raise the hood, turn on your flashers and keep all passengers together. •



SKI FITNESS FOR THE SUMMER

excerpted from **Snow Country** Spg/Smr '98

You are probably thinking it's nuts to be talking about getting in shape for snow skiing. Heck, the ski season is barely over and isn't it time to just hang out at the beach soaking up some rays and maybe hitting a couple of volleyballs or taking a cruise on the strand?

Think about it. It probably took you the whole winter season to get in decent shape for skiing. Why would you want all that hard work to go to waste? Be sure to warm up first and perform each exercise slowly and for the specified

1. **LEG LUNGES** (1 min)

Stand with your back to the incline of a hill. Bend your right leg back. Drop your rear knee until your front knee is 90°, return to start. Repeat for 1 min each leg.

2. LATERAL SKIPS (3 min)

Hold your arms straight out on each side at shoulder height. Flex knees and skip from foot to foot ten times before reversing direction. Emphasis Speed.

3. CALF RAISES (1 min)

Stand with feet hip-width apart on a step. With hands on hips, balance on the ball of your feet. Slowly push heels up a few inches and then lower heels over edge of the step.

4. TRI DIPS (1 min)

Rest hands on bench behind you with your feet straight out in front. Lower body until you feel contraction, return to start. Be sure not to lock elbows.

5. PUSH UPS (1 min)

Place hands slightly more than shoulder-width against an elevated surface. With straight back, lower body and return to start.

6. TUCK JUMPS (3 min)

From a tuck position, jump straight up, reaching for the sky. Upon landing, return to tuck. Emphasize height rather than speed. Try to land on balls of your feet. *
